

Historic Red Hook's Cemetery Crawl is both a seasonal Scavenger Hunt and a year-round self-guided tour of six Red Hook cemeteries that offers highlights of the lives of interesting individuals and their memorials. All you need is your smartphone and some good weather and you've got a lovely way to spend some time enjoying the history of our area. The Scavenger Hunt kicks off on Hardscrabble Day, September 17th and runs through the award ceremony on October 30th at the Elmendorf at 1 PM. Bookmark the Cemetery Crawl page at historic redhook.org and you're off! No need to wander aimlessly—by clicking on the Map section, you can use a custom Google map to find the approximate location of each memorial we've presented for the Cemetery Crawl. If you click on a pin, you can both read and hear a recording of the story associated with that memorial. If you're looking for even more self-guided history fun, we also have a "Then & Now" map with details of local homes and businesses for which we have historical information.

Strength, honor, steadfastness and immortality. The acorn is a symbol of life, fertility and immortality.






Scroll

Symbolizes immortal love or a union that will never fade. A broken rose symbolizes life cut short. [George W. Fraleigh, RH Methodist]






Lily of the Valley
